FORD FEST: COMMUNITY BBQ OR ETHICAL NIGHTMARE?

ABSTRACT

Ford Fest is an annual barbeque organized by one of Ontario's most powerful families: the Fords. The main concern is that Doug Ford, the Premier of Ontario, is using the event to make voters beholden to the Progressive Conservative Party; therefore, the ethics of Ford Fest must be examined. Applying Ford Fest to two conflicting ethical theories aids in determining the ethicality of Ford Fest. Due to their conflicting nature, if utilitarian and deontological approaches produce the same result they can create a broad consensus regarding an ethical dilemma.

RESEARCH QUESTION


Doug Ford's position as Premier places Ford Fest in the centre of an ethical dilemma. It appears that the event is intended to promote the political interests of the Progressive Conservative Party. Based on the activities and intended purpose of Ford Fest, one must ask: is the event ethical?



APPROACH

To find information regarding Ford Fest, Premier Ford's and the Ontario Progressive Conservative Party's social media was used. Their social media accounts depicted how the event was marketed to the public. News media articles provided facts regarding how the event was received by politicians and the public and the activities of the event. Once this information was collected, it could be applied to an ethical analysis using two competing theories: utilitarianism and deontology. The results of the analyses determined the ethicality of Ford Fest.

CONCLUSION
