How can the military language in hymns be interpreted?


ABSTRACT

Using principles of critical discourse analysis reveals that the language of military imagery in hymn lyrics can be read as a metaphor in three distinct ways in addition to a literal reading. First, the struggle to resist sin, evil and the devil; second, the defence of Christianity and the mission to bring heathens to the one true religion; and third, the


justification of colonialism and the supremacy of the British Empire.
